The TD let us down on its way to the Brailes Show.

We had been having misfiring problems and replaced the points and condenser, although after this it refused to start and the old condenser was replaced which seemed to cure the trouble which put a question mark on the quality of some new parts. The decision was made to convert to electronic ignition which so far.....!

Unfortunately, the TD has stood idle since September as we've been fully occupied fabricating a log cabin so the other half of the garage can be cleared to make way for it. The other half has been filled by a cheeky bid on a Porsche 944!

TF60

The TF160 has had a few sunny day runs and is now waiting it's hard top for the winter.

The main activity has been with Fays ZR where during the last few years I have been paying attention to some rust around the wheel arches where stone chips had started corrosion. This time we thought it would be best to have it

Continued from October's AMGC News

The next day it is executive decision time. Contact Stena and change the booking for Monday night. No problem. We drive back into Germany, find a hotel not too far from the car and sit it out until Monday morning. The Dorint Hotel in Duren is about as bland as they come, but it will do! Duren is not a natural tourist destination, but it will do!

Three not great days!

Time passes and Monday dawns. Our German friend has got the shipping details for the tyres: Hurrah! They will arrive between 10 and 12 this morning. At 1100 the van delivers them to ATU and they fit them. The tube that had come from the spare looked perfect and was the correct size, but appeared to have given way where it had rubbed on the tyre. The new tyres and tubes are Excelsior 4.75/5.00 x17...strictly they are for a Rover 10 as the 12 uses 5.00/5.25x17, but they are fine and are put onto the front axle. The price was similar to UK. We are on our way by 12.30 and, having negotiated the terrifying Rotterdam Ring road, are at the ferry by 5.30pm. Loading took time, but we were on board and in our cabin by 7.30.

Some interesting cars coming over...a couple of Dutch Vintage Bentlevs and a gentleman from Scotland with an historic front engine Formula Junior single seater on his way home from racing in Holland. No-one seemed to have any "post-Brexit" problems with customs. As ever the paperwork has to be right. The Scotsman had done several trips and said "As long as the Carnets are ok, you are fine." A Very Good Day!

Arrival in Harwich was on time and without delays - Stena are pretty good in my experience - and we were home by 1100am on Tuesday. Now all I have to do is a promised "Prom graduation" delivery in the Rover with the hood down...only a 110 mile round trip on top of the 155 miles from Harwich! Rover is perfect!

Another Good Day

Three days late and unexpectedly poorer by several hundreds of Euros, we are home. We will soon see how effective travel insurance is.... The Rover used no water, about half a litre of 20/60 (ves. really!) and did about 29 mpg (I have not got around to using the Freewheel yet. Now this trip is done I will try it!

Conclusions

Carry at least one spare tube! Don't take chances with tubes of unknown provenance. They may look ok, but if you don't know the history, bin them. I naively thought that as I had done a good number of miles and had the tyres & tubes off and checked that they would be ok. They were not! Check the fine print of the Breakdown cover. We were covered for recovery from the Autobahn, but any tyre related oncosts like delays, hotels etc were excluded!

Mechanically we had no problems. Good oil pressures and comfortable water

temperatures. The new radiator core was very reassuring in the Rover! The 3.9 (from an MGA) axle allows comfortable 70-75 mph cruising in the Magnette

The Rover is quite hard work to do much more than 3 - 4 hours a day with one driver. 200 miles is possible, but motorways at 55-65mph are not much fun. Lower category roads in France are fine because they are mostly speed restricted anyway, so it takes a long time to get anywhere! German minor roads are excellent, but again 30-35 miles in the hour is the norm. Holland has many ruthless speed limits and impatient drivers. Luxembourg is unexpectedly lovely with well-engineered roads. Mind you the car and two passengers had a combined age of 241 years so that might be an influence on these comments! Don't be nervous about touring in Europe...be prepared and just do it!

The Napier Lion Engine Backstory

The other book is "Typhoon" by Wing Commander Mike Sutton the inside story of an RAF Fighter Squadron at War. A former Royal Navy veteran friend lent it to me.

Mike's father had expected him to become a Solicitor, thankfully Mike enjoyed a much more fulfilling career. He became Wing Commander of 1 Squadron (the oldest Squadron in the world, and led it into the war against ISIS on a 6 month tour of duty - without loss of people and assets). In terms of pure Leadership, it's the best book I've ever read.

Both books reminded me, just how proud I am to be British and helped me through a tough old time on a couple of issues that are testing me, let alone the challenging times in which we live.

Napier Lion Golden Arrow

The Land Speed Record of 231mph was achieved in a Napier Lion Golden Arrow in 1929 by Sir Henry Segrave. See photo of it and the red 1000 hp (only c900hp in reality) Sunbeam, which Segrave achieved 204 mph in 1927.

The Napier Lion engine

was the brainchild of their chief design engineer Arthur Rowledge, whom left to join Rolls Royce in 1924. There he took up the same role, working directly with Henry Royce and is personally credited with many successful aero engines, including the renowned Merlin.

His grandson was a fellow Chartered Accountant, and we Practiced together at Andersons for some 20 years.

First seen in 1917, and in production up to the early 1930s, the Napier Lion engine was designed for use in RAF aircraft. From the mid-1920s, more powerful versions were developed for racing applications in aircraft, boats and cars. The 900bhp Lion VIIA was used in the Supermarine S5 Schneider Trophy seaplane, Malcolm Campbell's 1927 Blue Bird and Henry Segrave's 1929 Golden Arrow. Following government directives, D. Napier and Sons turned from motor manufacture to aero engine production during the First World War. The result was the incredibly successful Lion series of engines developed by Chairman Montague Napier and Chief Designer Arthur Rowledge. The compact, 12 cylinder, engine was arranged in a 'W' or 'broad arrow' formation (Napier used the term Triple-Four). Later versions were used in Malcolm Campbell's 1931 Blue Bird and John Cobb's Railton Special. The final development, the Sea Lion, saw use in RAF air-sea rescue launches during the Second World War. Engine: 23,900cc, W12, double overhead camshaft, 450 – 1,300bhp depending on version (Lion VIIA as fitted in Golden Arrow 925 bhp at 3,3000rpm)




Setting Tappets

When setting the tappet clearance on 'B' and 'C' series engines I always used to struggle to find the maximum opening point on the corresponding tappet. I accidently stumbled upon this trick to make it much easier to determine the position of the related valve. All you need is a spare ½" AF combination spanner.

Position the spanner onto the adjusting nut of the opening valve as per the photo below. When the valve opens monitor the other end of the spanner and the movement of the rocker arm is amplified making it so much easier to find the point where the valve is fully open.

Adjust the clearance of the corresponding tappet as required. Job done!

Device for lifting & rotating the body shell of an MGB

A while back I restored a MG Roadster and constructed a device for lifting & rotating the body shell, I no longer have any use for this and are looking to sell it.

A brief description is below and if anyone in your club is interested I will take photo's and send them to you.

- Two Triangular frames from 50mm RHS approx (1 at front & 1 at rear)
- Pick up points on MG are from the front & rear bumper mounting points/tow bar.
- Body Lift is carried out by large diameter threaded bar in both triangular frames.
- Will raise body shell off floor and will allow complete 360 Deg rotation.
