Chairman's Report:

As this will be my final report as Chairman - Trevor and David will be giving a rundown of the events and stats - I thought I would give a review of the last 12 years that I have been Chairman. Those who were at the AGM when I was elected will remember that I was elected by a secret ballot, the works!!

When I took over I followed some advice I was give by the organiser of another Club I used to be a member of, which was: "Organise Events You Want to Do, then if No One Turns Up at Least You Will Enjoy it" and that is what I have done for the last 12 years with one exception, which I will come to.

I like to have reasons to use my MG so I have organised events that include our MGs. Therefore, I started by introducing the 'Drive-it-Day' run and the first one finished at the Fleece in Bretforton and I thought it was a success, so I organised more of them. The format was changed over the years to include booking lunch as most people prefered that. I also like going on visits so that first year also included going to the Patrick Collection one evening; a good thing we did as it is now closed. We also visited BMH a couple of times.

The exception was a 'Concourse' which the 'Vice-Chair' (Anne-Marie who was elected as my deputy but unfortunately she disappeared from the scene quite soon after) was keen to have. This became the 'Show Night' and still looks to be very popular.

The static Car Shows have not been ignored and we continue to attend a selection each year.

In 2012 Alan C joined the team as the Events Secretary and soon had the March Madness Run going. This became a staple of the calendar until he moved house and passed the Event's Batton on to Trevor. Alan was instrumental in getting us back to Malvern with the bacon sandwiches on offer (sometimes twice a year) and with the help of Steve, The Badsey Flower Show has become a regular (great to see the BBMF Fly past each year).

I'm always interested to hear peoples stories and knowledge, so once or twice a year we have had guest speakers to the Club Night. The first was Brian Moylan (ex-Abingdon employee) who gave us a history of MG and Roy Laycock who enthralled us with his round the world drive in Bridget the Midget, remarkable. Other guest speakers of note were: Warwickshire Police & Crime Commissioner, Horse Racing Jockey, Bentley History, Electric MGB, MGOC's Roger Parker and my favourite Stuart Turner.

With the funds we have generated over the years (from the now defunct Heritage Run and the monthly Raffle) we have purchased several pieces of equipment for the use of the Club, including 2 Storm Shelters, a new banner, Club Event Rally Plates and Club Clothing. We have also made a number of Charitable Donations and where possible I have tried to organise a presentation of the funds so the recipient can also try and receive some publicity. Recipients include Alcester Day Care Centre, Stratford Hospital, GWR Toddington (the 'Retreat' building, worth a visit), Stratford Hospice and the MS Therapy Centre in Coventry, all good worthwhile causes.

Another thing I have tried to improve on is the Newsletter which is sent out every month (and I have not missed many) and was issued twice a month during the 'Lockdowns'. Hopefully it has got better and bigger over the years with something of interest for everyone. I didn't have the skills or the software to improve the layout so was very pleased when Norman agreed to be the editor and he has done a great job.

Those in the MGOC may have noticed in Enjoying MG that they have an annual Newsletter competition and I have sent an entry several times but having asked for copies of the winners, I realised that we needed Norman on board to compete and I have sent an entry again for last year, fingers crossed.

Each year I have tried to add in some new events or runs, so shows like the BMC & Leyland Show, Pershore Plum Festival, Churchill Classic Car Show, Brailes was resurrected and Broughton Castle was tried before the Lockdowns.

The runs featured the Chilly Willy (sometimes repeated), Heritage Run Re-visited, The Chairman's Picnic and a couple of my favourites, the Alscot Park to Henley Run in favour of the Air Ambulance and the 'Birthdays Run' to Nuffield Place.

There were even 2 trips to Stratford Races. A weekend Away was also introduced (not by me I hasten to add) and continues today organised by a small group of our members. The Events I'm proudest of are the Social Distance Runs, which took place during the COVID Pandemic when normal meetings were not an option. In all there were 4 of them and it kept us going during those difficult event free days. The latest addition to the Events list has been the Breakfast Meeting at BMM (thanks to Steve for the push to introduce it) and this is slowly gaining a regular following.

The good thing about the future is that more people are getting involved with the organising of runs and events like Trevor with the Aunt Sally & Happy Herefords, David last year, Alan the previous year & Nick this year with the Drive-it-Day Run and Alan & Richard with the Warner's Holiday. This bodes well for the future, we just need more of you to come forward and participate with the organisation.

To close I would like to say a big thank you to all of you for making the last 12 years so enjoyable. It has been a great pleasure and a privilege to be the Chairman of our wonderful Club, which of course is as good as it is because of you the people in it.

Treasurer's Report

Roger was not able to attend, however copies of the accounts were circulated and Paul gave the report. The Club is in very good financial health with over £1,400 in funds. Most of the items are equal on the Receipts and Payments columns, I have always tried to run events to break-even, with the exception of the Show Night when the Club pays for the prizes and the Xmas Meal where the 'Free' raffle is partly covered by Club funds.

As ever the raffle provides more income than we currently spend, however we do need to keep an amount to cover any possible expenditure but there are sufficient funds to consider making a charitable donation, unless there is some equipment the Club needs to purchase.

Events Secretary Report

There were 13 events during the year, excluding club nights and show night.

5 of these events included a picnic. Of which only 1 of these included a run.

5 events included a cooked meal. 3 of which also included a run. Excluding Xmas meal.



We had the long weekend away at Cricket St Thomas. Vital Spark was a visit only event. And, our Xmas meal Best supported event was Drive it Day with 26 cars and 49 people.

Least supported was Ragley Hall with 8 cars. The average number of cars for 10 events was 17 cars. Excluding Cricket St Thomas, skittles and Xmas meal. 5 different people, excluding Alan and Richard, organised regular events.

Conclusions...

...which may help my successor and the club going forward. Events involving food and drink are the most popular. Interesting that the best attended, Drive it Day with a cooked meal was only 4 cars more than Badsey, which was a picnic.

Socialising and the ability for people to mingle easily, i.e., the picnic events, were the most popular. The weekend away and the upcoming week away also shows how well the social scene is supported. A bit disappointing that only 4 events included a run.

It is becoming more difficult to find venues that can supply cooked food to 30-40 people, in a timely way. Some of the more interesting venues we would like to do a run to, cannot. As we have a core membership of 30 – 40 people who attend events on a regular basis, this will be an ongoing problem, I feel.

We have even tried to arrange picnics in interesting places, where we would pay a reasonable parking fee. Dumbleton Hall, National trust, but they were quite expensive. With inflation and what seems to be the cost of everything rising, is it worth looking at the club subsidising future events at the sort of quality places we may want to visit. With the number of club members that we have, where only 5 organised events last year, I would encourage all members to think about organising events. With the high number of ladies in the club their input to new events would be welcomed. Turn it into a fact-finding mission with food and a pint along the way. And finally, good luck to my successor and all members for supporting the events. Thanks too to all of our helpers, who've helped us at our events.

Database Report

What Have You Done In or With Your (or someone else's) MG?

Heavy Engineering!

Well, progress is being made, all be it slower than I would have really liked.

The block has been through the engineering company and is now re-bored, the crank re-ground and cylinder head has had new valve guides and seats replaced for un-leaded fuel.



One mistake I made was to take the block for re-bore before I had cleaned off all the old paint and removed the core plugs so another visit was needed to the engineering company to have it hot washed again.



Over the years I have continually been on the look out for original parts as often anything being re-manufactured has come from distant foreign shores and is not always to the quality that one would expect. Ebay, with all its pitfalls, often comes up trumps with odd, random bits and finding a set of new oversize Hepolite pistons was a particular coup. Reading reports on various MG forums there is quite a variation in the quality of pistons from other sources so it quite a relief to have found those.

One particular job which I was dreading was the fitting of the of piston rings. The last thing I wanted was to break one (£££!!). So, I bought a pair of simple piston ring pliers and it made the task so easy.




As the crankshaft had been reground I took the opportunity to have it balanced along with the flywheel and clutch cover.

When working on my cars I aways try to keep things as standard as possible, however I have made one exception this time and that was to have the flywheel lightened. From early production of the 'C' engine one criticism has been its reluctance to pick up revs which was due to the excessive weight of the flywheel. Weighing in at a smidge under 15kg it really is a monster and so it was put under an extreme weight loss regime.

So, re-assembly now begins in earnest but finding the best way to manipulate the engine was not without its concerns. I have an engine hoist but this doesn't really allow me to turn the block over and work on the underside and trying to turn the block over whilst it was being supported by the hoist and slings was erring on the





point of being very dangerous. I had often seen engine stands being used when rebuilding engines but these always seemed to be smaller 4 cylinder or alloy blocks. Would one of these stands really be up to the job of supporting a 'C' engine?

Well there was only one way to find out. Luckily I was able to find a stand being advertised on Facebook which was rated at 630kg which in theory should give me a 100% margin. I took the plunge and hey presto it worked like a charm. Just to be safe however I did support the engine with the hoist and sling at the other end.


What have I done with my MG? Well not a lot having been away seeing my daughter and family in Oz for two months. But I did spend my time MG spotting.

MGF Brake Upgrade

Following my recent MOT on the MGF although it passed we had two advisories:

First was pitted front discs and second was slightly worn rear wheel bearings. Considering I had not replaced either of these over the last 15 years of ownership I decided to replace the wheel bearings and try to upgrade the braking system all round the car.

Reading recommendations on the MGF forums I decided to replace all four brake discs around the car with drilled and grooved style units which I am informed offer improved braking. The company who manufactured and supplied the discs along with Mintex brake pads was MTech based in Birmingham but also available on line.

Approximate cost of the refurb was £150 for the parts. I also replaced the brake fluid in the system at the same time.

The bearings I purchased from a company called RTG based in Lancashire available on line cost approximately £20 per bearing. All the parts arrived in a couple of days and a friend who is a retired motor engineer ensured all the work was completed correctly.

I am currently running the brakes in but there appears to be an improvement in the brake system and quieter running on the road. If anyone wants any further information let me know.


