

On club night in September we were privileged to receive a talk from Hazel Carter. She gave us a truly inspirational and heart-warming talk about the life journey that she shared with her husband Alan following his diagnosis of contracting motor neurone disease.

Alan who was a former member of the club owned a red MGB roadster called Morris which was bought back in 1980 with the intention of taking tours on the continent as part of their retirement plans. However, in late 2017 he received the devastating news that he had between six months to two years to live.

Not to be defeated Alan and Hazel gave it their very best shot and embraced the challenges that life would throw at them in the following two years. This included taking a holiday of a lifetime in Vietnam, several breaks in the UK as well as attending many social events.

Between the time that Alan had been diagnosed with MND and his passing Hazel keep a dairy. The highs, the lows and cruel detail of what this dreadful disease can dish out. This inspired her to write her book – Life's Good, It's the disease that's the problem.

store to make £500, the overall amount




display the butterfly, run a tombola, and other games, to raise their money. Success, they raised over £600.

Happy Herefords Three Counties Run

Once again, this third time annual run was to end with the unique dining experience at the Happy Herefords Barn in Tysoe. I wanted to keep up the standards set by previous runs to Tysoe by making it an interesting, challenging run-on roads new to many.

I know of many local roads that span three counties, Warwickshire, Oxfordshire and Northamptonshire, many even I have not travelled since I was a young person. Many with the potential to provide an interesting run in our MGs, but as always finding a starting point to meet our needs close to these roads, is key to getting off to a good start.

Step forward the National Herb Centre at Warmington, 5 miles north of Banbury, perfect for my desire to get to some challenging roads. A quick visit, coffee and a chat with the Manager and all was arranged, slightly earlier opening, reserved parking and a separate area for us to convene. However, it was such a warm sunny day that all ventured outdoors, which made marshalling the unruly mob to their cars for our designated leave time far from easy. The warm sunshine was to stay with us all day, and all that could, had their hoods down, for what was uninterrupted wall to wall sunshine, which really made the day, unlike our wet Aunt Sally venture. If you fancy a drive out and a coffee, this venue has a small classic car meet the first Saturday of the month, 10am to 1pm, all in aid of charity.

So, a quick chat to confirm the ethics of our run and to outline what was in store for the intrepid participants with a warning for one of the roads. 42 people had signed up for the Happy Herefords gourmet meal 16 cars on the run, 1 cancellation and 8 people going straight to the barn for their meal. The run was to cover 50 miles, 99% not on main roads. Not only would we pass through three counties, but we would also pass through 20 villages. I did point out that I would be amazed if all made it round this testing route and to this end, we added every village in the order that we would pass through them, so that lost souls miles from home could have a



chance to get back on track.

If anyone in the club would like a copy of this run to complete at their leisure, we have some spare copies.

Whilst travelling the proposed route, some of the roads had deteriorated from how I remembered them, it was only a small proportion of the roads, but doubt began to creep in, but then I thought no, they are a tough lot and a



challenge is needed, to stimulate a good appetite. I decided that if I made people aware of the perils, by writing in red ink and advising to drive carefully, low sports cars could go where any sensible person would use a 4 x 4. Angie was very sceptical.



Extracts from emails to Ed:


Graham learned from a cartoonist once that there is a thing in the cartoon world called a "grawlix". Absolutely true.

There was strong smell petrol, so up went the bonnet and sure enough there was petrol leaking out of the float chamber joint. No problem some new seals on order, which came a few days later (well done MGOC Spares). With a bit of fiddling the new seal was installed and



whilst I was there a small turn on the throttle stops to lower the idle speed. Well when I came to fire her up she would not run smooth, so I played around, then gave up and called in the expert. Lech was soon round and we went thorough the full process of tuning the carbs but we could not get her to run smoothly!!

We stripped everything down and checked the needles and jets. The needles were 'AAU', so looked up the spec in the very useful S.U. Specification Catalogue to find that the post 1976 cars should have ACD needles. Looking back through the file of receipts that came with the car there are many relating to cleaning and tuning the carbs but go back even further and there

What could be wrong?

Hey presto, she was running a lot better

The only thing I had noticed when fitting the needles into the piston was that the needle guides were different sizes but didn't think this would be a major problem, however now clutching at straws, we said let's make them both the same. Lech peddles up his grinding wheel and trims the longer one until they are both the same length. Refit them and back to the tuning process, from the beginning again of course and hey presto, she was running a lot better, time was running out, so we left



it there and will have another go when the car has been run for a few miles. Carbs are strange things and definitely a black art, beware and don't trust a set of refurbished SUs!!

I can do the job blind fold now

The saga continued, the run to Brailes Show went OK, so I used her to go to the Breakfast Meeting but by the time I got home the engine was so rough it was almost undriveable. Fortunately I was going with Lech to Aldon Automotive the following week and whilst there guizzed one of the experts and his suggestion was the bi-metallic strip that adjusts the jet height for temperature. He kindly stripped, what must have been a scrap HIF Carb and gave me the part. A comparison with my original showed some differences, so carbs rebuilt yet again (I can do the job blind fold now) with no changes from the last tune-up and the car has never run better. I have taken one of the plugs out and gone has all the black soot replaced by a nice biscuit colour. The car is not running perfectly yet but at least it looks like it will.

5. Black MGB The YA was followed by a rubber bumper 1980 MGB GT. A work colleague was retiring and moving to a smaller property which had no space for a second car.



I ran the MGB for a couple of years during which time I decided that I'd fancy rebuilding a MGB (but not a rubber bumper version).

6. 2nd MGB So, I bought a rather sad looking 1968 MGB GT. I was lucky enough to lay my hands on a superb 1968 Californian bodyshell with literally no rust. I rebuilt the car using the US body and the old B as a donor.



I covered many miles in the restored MGB without any problems but I eventually decided that I fancied another prewar MG. A colleague who had acquired a TA some years earlier was moving house and his business. Due to these changing circumstanced he decided to sell the car.

1. 1st TA This was a great car to learn about mechanics and also how to upgrade and maintain a prewar vehicle. I learned an awful lot and greatly enjoyed driving this car. I last saw it at the 1980 Beaulieu Autojumble Auction where it was sold to someone in Switzerland..



2. PB While owning the TA, I was offered a PB (£60). The engine was seized but it was a very original vehicle. I rebuilt the engine and running gear, eventually selling it and buying an engagement ring for Pam (now my wife).

Unfortunately I've only side shots of the PB, I can't remember the registration or chassis number so I can't establish if it still exists

1. 1st TA



4. YA On selling the PA, with the house restoration nearing completion, I fancied another project so I acquired a 1948 YA. The car needed much bodywork repair (which isn't my forte) so after getting the engine running, I sold it on.

7. 2nd TA In 1994 I purchased the 1938 TA and commenced its complete restoration; it took three years to finish but it was well worth it. Pam and I attended many MGCC European Events in this car visiting France, Germany, Switzerland, Belgium, Luxembourg, Denmark and Holland.



While enjoying the TA I was offered and bought a very original VA which had remained and was serviced in the same village since new. After owning the TA for 12 years and promising Pam a new kitchen I sold the car to a German gentleman via Barry Walker in 2005.

8. VA The 1936 VA stood in my garage for nearly ten years. I got the engine running and drove it around the block but the bodywork and upholstery was well beyond my capabilities so I sold it to a Dutchman.



In 2005, just as I was MG-less a friend asked me if I would be interested in a free 1970 Midget. I looked at the car and decided to have it.

9. Midget The owner was quite upset to part with the Midget; he had bought it new with a staff discount as he worked for BL. I gave him £20 to buy a bottle of whisky to reduce the pain!



Luckily, soon after getting the Midget I was offered a second hand but new Heritage body which became the basis of the rebuild, I rebuilt the engine to produce 80 bhp.

Once finished, we travelled around Europe, again entering many MGCC European Events to Switzerland via France and Germany, Denmark, Holland, Sweden, Norway (up to the Artic Circle) also touring Ireland. The car was sold in August 2023 to fund the purchase of a L1 Magna.

10. J1 During the period that I ran the Midget I still had a hankering for another prewar MG. An opportunity arose to acquire a 1932 J1 Salonette rolling chassis



The MG had been driven into a garage after the war and sometime in the 60's the roof collapsed completely ruining the body. I spent the following years acquiring parts to start the rebuilding the car as a J2 but decided to sell it to a Paul Dunster with the intention of helping him with the rebuild.

11. Metro During my working career as a highway engineer with Warwickshire County Council, I also ran MGs as everyday family cars. First was a Metro, which had to accommodate the family on our camping holidays in France (a bit of a squeeze)!



The photograph was taken during the MGCC Midland Centre's Production Car Trials at Burton Dassett Hills.


12. Maestro After the Metro a Maestro followed. Touring in Europe continued with the family fitting more comfortably.

13. ZR With the family grown up a ZR followed, a lovely, fun car to drive with continuing forays into Europe.



We continued taking part in the MGCC European Events, with frequent tours around the UK, either in the TA or ZR.

14. L1 Magna So now at 71 years of age it's time to acquire the MG I've always dreamed of owning, a six-cylinder Magna.



During July 2023 I received a phone call from Barry Walker, a 1933 L1 Magna which he had sold back in 1978 had come onto the market and Barry was selling on behalf of the owner. After seeing the Magna I just couldn't resist!

I now own the MG that's been my ultimate wish for many, many years probably my last!

Gaydon first for Arden Run by Phil Fellows

Phil Fellows was just looking through some old MG Enthusiasts and found this

It reads: CHOOSING A BANK HOLIDAY Sunday in Stratford-upon-Avon to start a social run is a certain recipe to bring the town to a standstill. On Sunday 2nd May 1993 the Arden MG Club managed to achieve this by releasing nearly 180 MGs onto the public highway. The brilliant midspring weather had brought daytrippers early into the town increasing the traffic almost to saturation before Mick Love, the Mayor of Stratford, waved the oldest cars off to start the 1993 Heritage Run.

The original idea for the run came as a result of members of the Arden MG Club wishing to drive out to the Heritage Motoring Centre the day after it officially opened. So much interest was shown that in January it was decided to advertise the event nationally. The response was very positive and by the end of April almost 200 cars had been entered.

The route chosen to the Museum ran through the lesser known parts of South Warwickshire with the Cotswolds acting as a backdrop. The original route included the Burton Dassett Hills from which at least seven counties can be seen. Unfortunately 'New Age Travellers' beat the Club to the hills and the roads leading to the area were effectively sealed off by the police.

Last minute detours had to be hurriedly arranged as the original route had already been printed. However, all navigators seemed to cope extremely well with the new directions and the run turned out to be just as enjoyable.

The event, which was sponsored by Bromsgrove MG Centre, was open to MGs regardless of age, which attracted a very wide range of models, the oldest being a 1928 14/40 and the youngest a 2.0 Efi. Almost every model produced from the mid 30s onwards was well represented and although the condition of the cars was never a consideration to qualify for entry, many comments were made by the public and enthusiasts about the remarkably good condition of all the cars.

The MGs assembled at at the Marbird Centre, which is a large shopping complex on the north side of the town. Burger King kindly agreed to open early ensuring that facilities were near to hand and although the weather turned out to be excellent, there was a cool breeze in the morning, so hot drinks and warm food was appreciated by many.

The Mayor of Stratford-upon-Avon dropped the flag at 11.00am, the cars left the car park and soon everything stopped! Slowly entrants struggled their way through the town and eventually onto the open roads, only to meet another traffic jam 10 miles down the route.

This one was due to a combination of a Bank Holiday, a Sunday Market and a gathering of VWs. Once past this hiatus the rest of the run consisted of approximately 30 miles of narrow, twisting lanes, hills and panoramic views of Warwickshire.

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The run terminated at the newly opened Heritage Centre where the cars parked outside the main building on a large area provided by the Museum. A truly magnificent sight! At this point most entrants went into the Centre of which no doubt a lot will be written over the next few months. Two prizes were awarded by the Club. These consisted of voochers to be spent in the Museum shop. One was given to Mr. Hiley with a 1972 Midget from likley in Yorkshire for the distance award, the other went to Mr. White with a 19/40 for the oldest combination of driver and white.

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At the end of the day many taking part were kind enough to thank the Club for arranging the Heritage Run and asked if this might become an annual even which could be arranged if another suitable venue, similar to the Heritage Centre, can be

Earlier in the year our new Chairman Mike thought it would be a good idea to have a short presentation about the history of the Arden MG Club and Fred agreed to put some thoughts together, however he was not available on the Club Night the talk was planned, so I took up the reins and added some information of my own. Not everyone would be at a Club Night, so in preparation for the Club's 35th Anniversary at the October Meeting here are the notes from Fred and myself:

I first attended the club early in 1989 having heard of it from a friend. I had just got FWK 46L back together after a full restoration during the previous year. (now owned by David and Diane).

Roger and Pat Vardy-Smith owned and ran the pub.

At that time the bar at the Golden Cross was much smaller. What is now the main bar area was living accommodation. The bar consisted of the narrow front part of the ground floor with a small snug between the bar and the loos. The dining room was much as it is now but with Pat's vast and famous collection of dolls on display everywhere on the premises.

At the first meeting I attended there were half a dozen or so of us and I recall Roger Vardy-Smith - Landlord, John Saunders - Chairman, David Witham, Eddie Hollier

Richard and Jo?, Gordon Reading.

Apparently John and Julie Saunders went for a meal in their MGB and parked next to a very smart MGB GT. Over dinner they got talking to Steve and Carol Farr on the next table to discover they were the proud owners. When John went for drinks Roger was wearing an MG T-shirt and suggested setting up a meet. Roger, being a "clubby" type of person, had a word with others and the Arden MG Club was formed.

I'm not sure if they had been to any shows before I joined but we certainly attended a few that year and many thereafter (see plaques).

Shows were nothing like so plentiful in those days but the classic car scene has thrived since and nowadays we have to choose which to go to!

Soon after my first visit the club membership steadily grew and although I'm sure I shall have forgotten a few I remember the following joining within a year or two:

John Horne (events organizer for many years), Graham Pierce (Bromsgrove MG), Trevor Knight (Bromsgrove MG), Richard Workman, Lech Zakrewski, Alan Smith (future club and heritage run committee chairman), Roger Jackson (treasurer), John Mattocks, Alan Torbett (future events organizer, sadly passed away in 2006???), Paul Dunster (future chairman) and John Philps

The club really gained traction in our happy home at the Golden Cross and Richard Workman and Lech organized the first Arden MG Heritage Run in 1993.

This was a great success and became one of the midlands premier events for 25years. A committee was soon formed (of necessity due to the amount of work involved!)

On Roger and Pat's retirement somewhere around 1998 the Golden Cross changed hands and the new management didn't want what had now become quite a large club cluttering up their dining room once a month! So we tried various other venues including the Stag at Redhill and the Navigation at Wootton Wawen eventually settling for a few years at the Moathouse at Alcester. When the Golden Cross eventually changed hands again we returned to our spiritual home and have been here ever since.

Comments from Paul:

Back in 2018 I asked John Saunders if he could give me an accurate idea of when the first Club meeting was and this is what he sent me.

"I can only tell you my version of events leading to the first meeting, bit long but hope you can take out what you need! Julie and I were having a meal at the Cross, we had parked our MG next to a very smart GT . Over dinner and ear wigging, the couple at the next table owned it, it was newly restored and the couple were Steve and Carol. We had a very pleasant chat, I went for drinks and Roger was wearing an MG T shirt so I said "we ought to start a meet up here", Roger agreed I called back to ask if we could arrange and Sept / October was agreed and Roger would mention in the right places, 6 turned up! Richard, Eddie, Steve! Gordon, myself. Roger welcomed us and let us use the snug. I put forward all the things we needed, all was agreed and I ran for 3/4 years, it all seemed simpler then, £1 in the jar, no committee, or licences. Julie and I sav it's 1987/88? October 1988 would be my guess. The Arden was my suggestion so much hinged on the name it just seem to fit." This was confirmed by David Witham (who attended the second meeting) and Fred Bury who joined in the very early days. What I found out at this meeting from Steve Farr was that the reason John and Julie were having a meal was to celebrate John's 40th birthday and he has just had another 'special' birthday, which confirms that the first meeting was 1988.

Which agrees with Fred's recollections. A further thought which comes from Steve Farr after consultation with Brian Rainbow:



Arden MG Octagon Club at the Blue Boar:

Going back to late 1997/8 the Arden natter at The Golden Cross got too big for the pub, so Roger Vardy-Smith (the old Landlord) split the natter into two, pre 56 MGs on last Tuesday, post 56 MGs on first Tuesday evenings. When Roger sold the pub, the new Landlord did not want car clubs there, so the pre 56 MGs moved to the Blue Boar, and I believe the post 56 MGs went to the canal-side pub at Wootton Wawen

I can't remember this as it was right in the middle of our caravanning hobby when the MG's took a back seat.

After about a year or so the Golden Cross got another new Landlord, who invited the car clubs back. The post 56 MGs returned to the Golden Cross, but the pre 56 natter decided to stay at the Blue Boar. So that is the story behind the two natters. I have been going to the Blue Boar regularly since 1998 and it has been run by Brian Rainbow since then.

April 1998 - Club Clothing: Sweatshirts £13.50, Polo Shirts £12.00 & Baseball Caps £4.50.

1998 September - Club Badge, the idea first raised and John Horn sketched some ideas.

1998 October - Donations from the Heritage Run of £1,500.00 agreed.

1998 November - Xmas Meal has 80 people booked.

1998 December - Chilly Willy Run (1st Jan 1999) to start from the Golden Cross, 9.45 for 10am.

1999 February - Club Badge shown to be on Sale in March at £1.50 each.

1999 September - 10th Anniversary announced with a party planned for 5th October 1999!!!!!

1999 October - Allen added an email address to his contact details.
1999 November - Xmas Meal has 70 people booked for December meal.

2000 January - Announcement that the Golden Cross will soon have 'New Owners'.

2000 February - The Club Night was Roger's last night at the Cross.

2000 March - The next meeting (April Club Night) will be at the Navigation Inn, Wootton Wawen, which was set up by Tony & Diane Wright.

2000 May - Announcement that the next meeting will be at the Moat House, Coughton. 2000 October - The Xmas Meal will be at the Moat House and will be all in one room.

2001 January - Email addresses requested.

2001 February - Announcement that the April Meeting will be at The Stag, Red Hill, however it was subsequently reported that the room was too small & only

limited parking, so it was decided to return to the Moat House.

2001 May - Received an offer to return to the Golden Cross.

2001 June - Carl Bintcliffe of the Warwick Natter invited us to a BBQ at the Millwright Arms on 25th June (Carl is still listed as the contact for this natter,

their normal turn-out is approx 6-8.).

2001 July - Return to The Golden Cross in September for a trial was announced. this was followed by a letter to the Moat House to cancel the booking for

our Club Nights, 70% of members wanted to 'go home' to The Cross!!

2001 October - 50 people present for the Club Night.

2001 December - John Horn announces he will stand down as Events Sec.

2002 March - First appearance of Club Shield on Newsletter.

2004 July - Website 'Live'. 2004 September - Xmas Meal £19.95

2005 January - Jonathan Toulmin presented Club with Certificates for 4 square yards of Shelsley Walsh.
 2005 October - Restaurant at Golden Cross to be re-furbished with new carpet, so will become 'Non Smoking'.

2006 January - Record number of cars on Chilly Willy Run; 8 off.

2006 October - Comment from Allen "I have been in the Chair for ~14 years, is someone willing to take on the job and bring renewed enthusiasm?".

2007 September - Article in Enjoying MG about the Heritage Run.

2008 August - Newsletter written by Roger Jackson and David Rayner to be advised of address details for the Club Database.

2008 November - AGM, need new Chairman, Roger happy for the time being to be Treasurer 'plus' and Xmas meal has 62 booked.

2009 January - Geoff & Vicky Edge volunteer to be Chairpeople.

2009 February - First Newsletter from Geoff & Vicky.

2009 April - Newsletter appears on New website for the first time.

2009 May - Alan Cleobury joins the Club, he is one of five that night but the only one still with the Club.

2009 August - Paul has arranged a talk by Ian Pogson and demonstrate the 85th Anniversary TF (subsequently delayed until October).

2009 November - Mike Green attends for the first time. Geoff & Vicky announce move to Lincolnshire.

2010 December - First Newsletter for 12 months, announcing that 2 members intend to stand for the Chairperson position.


