In the Museum are the Winning cars from 1964, 5 & 7). Colin was very pleased to see both of the GTS cars RMO & MBL, especially next to each other, which has probably not happened for many years.





"My other car is . . . "

Remember those window stickers people used to have "My other car is a Ferrari / Porsche"? (About the same time a James Bond bullet holes?)

Well, we thought we'd stretch this concept to people whose lives also include other devices. The second in this series is an interview with Paul Dunster, whose "Other Car" is . . . a bike.

My other car is a Bike

Deputy Editor (DE): Paul – first: how long have you been a cyclist?

PD: Since I was about 10 – Winter 1964, Club Run on a Sunday – on a Tandem initially. We are a cycling family – Dad was a founder member of the "Rough Stuff Fellowship", using byways where possible.

Went on to be with the Altrincham & Sale CTC, doing Time Trials with Altrincham RC: 10m (23m 47secs) and 25m (Ihr 2m 22secs best). Medal performances!

In the picture we have Paul (he's the one on the bike) being readied for a time trial in the late 60s.

The bike pictured was his home-built 'Track Bike'.

Time Trials then consisted of a 15 mile bike ride to the event, high speed time trials . . and THEN 15 miles ride home. All in the one evening!

I had a very proud moment when I was presented with the BAR Cup – by my Dad. But time passed, life took over.

DE: When did it pick up again?

PD: Welford, 1985. Local chap, Ron, and myself started cycling regularly. I was very out of practice had to start a training regime!

DE: Do you still cycle together?

PD: Not together now but we meet on a bench in Claverdon.

DE: What changes have you seen in the cycling world?

PD: Certainly the clothing! I had a very smart Jersey . . . money was tight and it was actually a "copy", knitted by my mother.

DE: Helmets and saddles?

PD: Gosh, yes. Early helmets were strips of covered foam! Saddles? Well, the one you aspired to was the Brooks B17. Leather, and looked great! Later technology has never rivalled them. As for pedals – lots of changes there.

DE: How many bikes do you have? (Basing this on guitarists, for example, never have just one)

PD: Only the 2. The Blue 'Best' bike is for summer use and the red Hybrid is for the winter/wet weather runs.

DE: With a Cycling Club these days?

PD: Only with Ron, that's as competitive as I get.

DE: How many miles on a "run out"?

PD: Around 40 Km / 25 miles.

DE: Has puncture repair got any easier over the years?

PD: No!! It's far more difficult to get tyres off rims now; I've struggled several times to fit new tyres!!

DE: And, finally . . . your Grandchildren and Bikes . . .

PD: Poor Benjamin did not master the scuttle bug and struggled with a balance bike but has expressed an interest in being able to ride a bike as he has seen bikes parked at school.

Rory loves the scuttle bug, getting started with a balance bike and on a bike with stabilizers he struggles with pedalling.

Patrick was like a duck to water with the scuttle bug and balance bike. He now has the 'Bluey' bike with stabilizers, but not pedalling yet.

Very impressive for a small car club.


